It is impossible to fulfill God's summons to follow Him and serve Him without committing to a lifestyle of learning. This wonderful journey goes way beyond merely learning facts. Learning is both an attitude and a wide range of behavior and habits that lead to gaining knowledge, wisdom and ultimately

significant life change.

While the majority of churchgoers desire to honor Christ with their lives and even profess to think on biblical truths, <u>our recent study</u> found few actually engage in personal reading and study of the Scriptures.

When asked how often they personally (not as part of a church worship service) read the Bible...

- a similar number respond "Every Day" (19 percent) as respond "Rarely/Never" (18 percent).
- A quarter indicate they read the Bible a few times a week.
- Fourteen percent say they read the Bible "Once a Week" and
- another 22 percent say "Once a Month" or "A Few Times a Month."

"God's Word is truth, so it should come as no surprise that reading and studying the Bible are still the activities that have the most impact on growth in this attribute of spiritual maturity," Stetzer said. "As basic as that is, there are still numerous churchgoers who are not reading the Bible regularly. You simply won't grow if you don't know God and spend time in God's Word."








- What is God showing you? What is one thing you can do this week to be more obedient?
- Who is someone that you know well whom you see as regularly obedient to God? Step out and give them a call to see if you could meet for coffee and talk about how they have matured to that place.
- Does "obedience" sound more like a chore than a blessing to you?

- Address specific attitude changes by reading <u>Lord, Change My Attitude</u> by James MacDonald or suggest this <u>video study</u> for your small group.

Next Steps: Exercising Faith

Getting Real

Think of your friends and family members...among them, who do you trust the most? Who can you count on no matter what? Think of 2 or 3 people. Now that you have them in mind, list off the reasons why you have come to trust and count on them:

Think of a time when you felt you should have had more faith but didn't feel like you had any. What happened that challenged your faith? Where did you find encouragement? Has this or another experience caused your faith to shrink a little...or a lot?

Trusting God is similar in many ways with learning to trust others. It is built on experience...realizing someone says what they mean and

does what they say they will do. Even if you have been disappointed or struggled in your faith in the past, are you willing to learn to trust God is Who He says He is...God does what He says He will do?

Thankfulness

Challenge yourself to list a dozen things you are thankful for each day this week. Trusting God is closely related to acknowledging and welcoming his activity in your life.

Select Hudson Taylor's Spiritual Secret by Dr. and Mrs. Howard Taylor for the next biography you read.

Suggest that your small group study on of these Bible studies on faith:

- <u>Interrupted: An Adventure in Relearning the Essentials of Faith</u> by Jen Hatmaker Discover God is interrupting the lives of Christ-followers and reminding them that He cares deeply about issues of justice and mercy.

- <u>Stand Against the Wind</u>, a video study by Erwin McManus Character transformation comes, not from facts and proposition, but from standing against the wind to become all God designed you to be.

Read <u>Crazy Love: Overwhelmed by a Relentless God</u> by Francis Chan or listen to the <u>audio book</u>. God is calling you to a passionate love relationship with Himself. Because the answer to religious complacency isn't working at a list of do's and don'ts - it's falling in love with God.


Seven times, in the Gospel of John, Jesus gives Himself a name. Read each of these names and verses and think about what they tell you about Jesus meeting your specific needs.
